



## The Power of Feedback: Using Data to Tell Our Story, Generate Feedback, and Promote Improvement

Data and evidence tell a story that needs to be communicated in clear and understandable ways to be useful for the child welfare workforce. This session explores the importance of building capacity and skills to effectively communicate and consume data at all levels of the workforce and across stakeholder groups. Participants will see examples of best and innovative practices in data communication and will learn how to incorporate data visualizations as a part of feedback loops and as a mechanism to support improvements. Participants will explore how telling a story can be a part of a child welfare system's effort to create a culture of learning.
